David Brenneman, director of collections and exhibitions, and Frances B. Bunzl Family Curator of European Art at the High Museum of Art, will consider the definition of a masterpiece, and how it has changed over time. He will illustrate his talk with works of art drawn from the exhibition "The Louvre and the Masterpiece," on view in Target Galleries. This lecture will address three themes: the changing historical and cultural definitions of a masterpiece; authenticity and connoisseurship; and the evolution of taste and scholarship with a focus on painting.

In the Renaissance and Baroque, ancient Graeco-Roman sculptures were considered the most precious trophies in any art collection. Marbles such as the 'Genius Borghese' and the 'Leaning Aphrodite' - on view in the exhibition 'The Louvre and the Masterpiece' - were admired as tangible testimonies of an ideal past, as aesthetical and ethical models to be emulated, and even as keys to understand the essence of beauty. The lecture shows how collectors redicovered the art of classical mediterranean antiquity during the Renaissance and pinpoints different functions served by individual statues in collections of the period.

Antoine-Louis Barye (1795-1875) was renowned for his realistic depictions of animals, especially those engaged in life-and-death struggles. Lion with Serpent (1832-33) was commissioned by King Louis-Philippe for the Tuileries Gardens, and was on display there from 1836 to 1911. Isabelle Leroy-Jay Lemaistre will examine how Barye pushed the technical boundaries of casting bronze sculpture by creating this piece with a single bronze pour.
