Lesson

Content Objectives

- Explore a storybook and artwork in the galleries
- · Explore using foam forms and animal shapes

Skill Objectives

What students will do

- Listen to and talk about a storybook
- Make theme connections from the book to the artwork (color and shape)
- Manipulate materials related to theme

What students will learn

- Language acquisition and critical thinking
- Visual perception and discrimination

Activities

Introduction

Museum Rules

- Looking Eyes (making circles with hands around eyes)
- Listening Ears (have children wiggle ears)
- Quiet Hands (put hands in their lap)
- Inside Voice (put finger to mouth and make "shhhh" sound)

Picture Frame Rhyme

- Can be spoken or sung to the tune of "I'm a Little Teapot"
- Pass picture frame to each child in turn
- Have them hold up the frame to their face and say/sing the following
- Repeat for each child

"Looking through my picture frame, who do I see? I see [INSERT NAME] looking at me!"

Artful Kids Rhyme

• Can be spoken or sung to the tune of "Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star"

It's story time at Mia
I'm so glad you're here today
The art is here for everyone
So, let's get ready to have some fun
We'll sit down and read a book
And take our time to talk and look

Gallery

Movement

• Walk quietly like a mouse through the galleries, or with fingers on head like mouse ears

Artwork connections and manipulative exercise

- With your chosen artwork(s), mimic the mice's activity in the book making a figure out of foam shapes
- Provide each child with a foam board and bag of forms
- Allow them to explore making a picture with the shapes
- Talk about the colors and shapes they see in the artwork in the gallery
- Ask them individually to tell you about their picture of or if they would like to share with the group what they made

Viewing Frame looking activity

- Provide students with viewing frames
- Have students look for details in the artwork through their viewing frame (face, hands, colors, etc.)
- This could be used on the walk back to the lobby for an additional looking exercise
