Since its discovery in 1611, the *Borghese Gladiator*—seen nearby in Vinache's original-sized bronze cast—was admired and employed as a model of anatomical study. The anatomical treatise on this statue by the military doctor Jean-Galbert Salvage meticulously records the muscular and skeletal systems of the *Borghese Gladiator* in twenty-two large-

scale engraved plates, accompanied by a detailed descriptive text. In order to check the sculptural representation of anatomy against reality, and to achieve the utmost precision in his twolayer copperplate engravings, Salvage dissected the bodies of young soldiers killed in duels and arranged them in the sculpture's pose.

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
