The Renaissance 15th – 16th Centuries

Essentially religious views of nature and humankind begin to change dramatically in the European Renaissance

Medieval feudalism, yielded slowly to the competition of strong city-states






San Zeno Altarpiece, Andrea Mantegna, c. 1457-1460, Basilica di San Zeno, Verona










Trinity with the Virgin, Saint John the Evangelist, and Donors, fresco, Masaccio, Santa Maria Novella, Florence, 1425-27







