Baroque Art in France and England

Key Ideas

- Both France and England underwent significant political and religious turmoil in the 17th century.
- French Baroque develops in the late 17th and 18th century, achieving the greatest expression in Versailles and the court of Louis XIV. The arts (education and patronage) are strictly controlled by the king and his appointed officials.
- In both France and England, Flemish Baroque painters were influential, working for the monarchs of both nations, and spreading the Baroque style.
- The work of French Baroque artists particularly draws upon Classical influences. Many French Baroque painters spent time working in Italy, especially Rome, where they absorbed these influences.
