Art of the Pacific Islands (guest lecture by Dr. Eric Kjellgren)

Key Ideas

- The Pacific region is vast, with four separate cultural regions: Australia, Melanesia, Micronesia, and Polynesia. These areas, in turn, have diverse cultures within them (for example, New Guinea has 800 separate cultural groups).
- The art of the Pacific Islands is often divided by gender. Women work in the fiber arts and men work in carving wood, stone, and shell.
- Much of the art in the Pacific Islands was devoted to portraying gods, spirits, or ancestors.
- In Polynesia, the people were ruled by hereditary chiefs. Many prestige objects are from this area.
