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Ground Rules

Interpreter's work

- □ Where will you work with me?
 - Sunday tours
 - School group tours
 - One on one tours/special requests
 - Lectures/discussions
 - Art cart
 - Special events/exhibitions

My Key Concerns

- □ What's the content of our tour?
- □ Can I hear you?
- □ Can the Deaf patron see me?
- □ Can we all see the artwork?
- Do all patrons have the opportunity to participate?

Patron's concerns

- □ Where does the tour start?
- □ Where will I meet the interpreter?
- Talk to the Deaf patron like a regular visitor
- Pointing in front of the interpreter

Docent's concerns

□ ???????

Pre-tour

□ Meet docent 15 min before tour

- Find out topic of tour-answer my questions, vocabulary, dates, etc.
- Negotiate our logistics
 - □ Arriving at the artwork
 - □ Talking about the artwork
 - □ Asking cooperation from the group

Pre-tour continued

- Answer your questions, make you feel at ease
- Introductions

During the Tour

- □ Wait for tour to assemble
- □ Make sure I am next to you
- □ Sight lines
 - Make sure Deaf patrons can see me
 - Don't obstruct sight lines-pointing
 - Navigate working with a DB patron

During the tour-Cont.

- □ Lag time
- Questions and answers
- □ Group involvement
- When we move to the next piece-Do's and Don'ts

After the Tour

- □ Remaining questions from the patrons
- Debrief with the interpreter
 - Feel free to discuss any awkward moments
 - If you enjoy working with this population, sign up to guide the American Sign Language tours!
