Anthurium Flamingo flower	Anthurium		red pink	Native to the Americas (northern Mexico to northern Argentina)  Symbol of hospitality, happiness, abundance
Astilbe False Goatsbeard False spirea	Astilbe		white pink rose	Native to mountain ravines and woodlands in Asia and North America.
Australian fern Rough tree fern	Cyathea australis		green	
Baby's Breath	Gypsophila			Symbol of innocence, purity of heart.
Balloon Flower	Platycodon grandiflorus,			A clump-forming perennial so named because its flower buds puff up like balloons before bursting open into outward-to-upward-facing, bell-shaped flowers with five pointed lobes. Plants are native to China, Japan, Korea and Siberia. Purple-blue flowers (to 2-3" across) bloom throughout summer.
