Modigliani, Head 62.73

Anna Akhmatou is the model for Modigliani and his muse. She is a Russian poet/writer. She met Modigliani while on her honeymoon in Paris. They would spend much time in Luxemburg Garden reciting poetry to one another and flirting. They had tempestuous relationship. Modigliani died young.

Matisse, White Plumes 47.41.

The woman in the painting is Antoinette Arnaud. She was very chic, had great panache. Matisse made the hat she is wearing himself. She was able to make it appear very chic. In contrast to Picasso, who treated women poorly, Matisse liked powerful women with force and character and treated them well. Matisse's models were much more than muses they were partners. They were treated with respect, worked very hard and paid well. They have been debates about the Matisse relationships with his models. Many believe they were platonic relationships. There is a quote by Matisse, "I never sampled anything edible that had served me as a model. Picasso, Woman in Armchair, 1927 63.2

Olga Khokhlova is woman in painting. She was a Russian ballet dancer. They married in 1918 and had a child together, Paulo, in 1921. In 1927, the year this is painted, Picasso begins an affair with Marie Therese Walter. Picasso is painting his deteriorating relationship with Olga in this painting.

Chagall, The Poet with the Birds 1911 61.36.7

This is painted two years after Chagall met Bella in Russia in 1909. He was very much in love with her. He was poor and she was from a better family. Chagall, in 1911, went to Paris to become a painter and to prove himself to be acceptable to her family. He returned in 1914 to Russia to marry Bella. They moved to St. Petersburg then the Russian revolution erupted and they could not leave. They had a baby, Ida, and finally left Russia in 1922. They made it to New York City before World War II. Many of Chagall's paintings show the joy of his love for Bella, his muse who provided beautiful inspiration, who died young, in 1944 of a throat infection.

Andrew Wyeth, Christina Olson 1947

Wyeth painted many paintings of Christina Olson including the famous Christina's World at MOMA. Christina was a neighbor of Andrew Wyeth where he summered in Cushing, Maine. Christina had a degenerative muscle disease and would drag herself around on the ground in her later years. Quote by Wyeth, "I wanted to do justice to her extraordinary conquest which most would consider hopeless." "If in some small way I have been able to paint to make the viewer sense that her world may be limited physically but by no means spiritually, then I have achieved what I set out to do."

She came from a upper class family as did Manet and they had similar social circles. Manet and Morisot professionally encouraged one another. Manet painted many paintings of Morisot in a very personal way. Morisot later married his brother, Eugene Manet.
