

- Count....always a good plan



I give myself a great big hug, I stand up straight and tall. I look right in front of me, I'm ready for the hall!


To the tune of "She'll Be Coming 'Round the Mountain:" We are quiet and now ready to move on...(and then, as softly singing, tip toe to the next object)

Pivot * dribble * fake * shoot!







So many people looking at me! (animals, paintings, birds, so many colors, patterns, shapes, food)

*Sing OR Say!

Words Work!

"1-2-3 Look at me!"

It's that simple! You've got this!

Songs, Poems, Rhythms and Rhymes!

Hickety Pickety Bumble Bee, Will You Say Your Name for Me? "Fabio." Repeat: Fabio. Then clap 3 times for 3 syllables.

Echo Greeting Song:

- "Good Morning" (students echo)
- "How are you"
- "It's so good"
- "To see you"
- "We'll look at art"
- "And find shapes" (colors, animals, whatever!)
- "And have a fun time today."

Dr. Jean to the rescue!

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Line Up Call Back
I say "line."
You say "up."
Line (teacher)
Up (Children)
I say "sit."

"Happy" – "Monday" etc.
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Let's Pretend!

Marshmallows - Have the children put "marshmallows" in their mouths (Puff out cheeks.) and put "marshmallows" on their feet. (Model walking slowly and gently.)

Museum Hands — Children clasp their hands behind their backs.


Butterfly Wings or Angel Wings - Children put their hands behind their backs and stick out their elbows and flap them like wings.

Question on feedback form: What is the difference between a "topic" and a "theme," in relation to school tours?



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Teachers will request a tour topic on the request form: e.g., Asian Arts and Artists; African Arts and Artists; Visual Elements and Principles, etc.

As the guide, you develop a theme within this topic, to provide that "thread" connecting the artworks on your tour. In developing a theme, think of what may be appealing to your audience: e.g., Sources of Strength (guardians and protection in Asian Art).

Each guide giving the tour may have a different theme.

Question on feedback form: What are the resources available for theme tours? How much time do we have to develop a themed tour?

Staff is creating a set of artworks, with supporting information (key ideas, suggested questions, and additional research sources) for every tour topic. Guides will be able to access these resources for tour planning.

Guides receive the same amount of time for planning a themed tour, so 4 to 6 weeks from the tour assignment.

Question on feedback form: Must we do virtual tours?

No, participation in virtual tours is not mandatory for guides.

We will send a survey to find out who is interested in continuing--or trying--virtual tours this coming winter/spring (January through March). A refresher session on virtual tours will be scheduled, to support us in meeting that need this winter/spring.

Do not worry about meeting your tour credit minimum this year.

Question on feedback form: Could I choose to only do Art Adventure tours OR themed school tours?

We need to tap from the pool of all school guides to meet the needs of incoming tour requests.

We are training this fall to help guides feel prepared for meeting those needs. If you do have questions, staff also has office hours available on Fridays (10 to noon) or by request.
