





"Mia Guides have one hour to give a tour. Do you have a tip or technique for encouraging students to share their observations or opinions?"

From Lucia, they/them: "Being slightly casual I think will open up the space to talk more as it feels more comfortable."

From Dani, she/her: "I would suggest using the "popcorn" method, however, this might only work for smaller groups. The "popcorn" method is when one person goes first and then they pass it onto a random person. Another way to get students to share their thoughts is to go with a more simple approach, such as asking them what colors, shapes, textures, details etc. they like about an artwork."


