


What do we know?

Lady Tashat was 15 to 19 years old when she died.

She was married.

Her father was Djehutyhotep (pronounced "je-hooti-HO-tep"), an official at Amon's temple in Thebes ("Doorkeeper of the Gold-House of Amon,").





The images on the cartonnage and coffin, inside and out, are to secure Tashat an afterlife.

Look closely to see the intricate carving of multiple lines of cuneiform inscriptions.



The large hydria (water pitcher) focuses on the roles and lives of women.

The name of the artist, "white sakkos painter," refers to the white bonnet (sakkos) worn by women.

The ox is one of the first domesticated animals in China. Oxen increased the productivity of farmers and were used for transportation.



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




Below, the Buddha sits between Brahma and Indra, two Hindu gods who were incorporated into the Buddhist pantheon as guardian deities.



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The Mali Empire, one of the largest and most powerful states in West Africa during the 1300s, owed much of its military advantage to its horses. (artsmia.org)


